Dr. Barbara A. Porter, ACOR Director

Barbara A. Porter has been the Director of the American Center of Oriental Research in Amman since 2006. She received her



A.B. from Bryn Mawr College and her M.A., M. Phil., and Ph.D. from Columbia University. From 1978 to 1986 she was on the curatorial staff of The Metropolitan Museum of Art (Egyptian Art and Ancient Near Eastern Art) and in the 1990s taught at New York University. She led several archaeological tours from Algeria to Iran in the ten years before moving to Jordan and now concentrates on the heritage of Jordan.

Dr. Jack Green, Project Lead / Associate Director

Jack Green joined ACOR as Associate Director in 2017. He is a Project Lead on the ACOR Photo Archive project and he supports ACOR's activities, including the



USAID–SCHEP project. Jack serves as the project director of the Temple of the Winged Lions Cultural

Resource Management Initiative (TWLCRM) at Petra. Jack received his B.A. degree from the University of Liverpool (1999) and M.A. and Ph.D from the Institute of Archaeology, University College London (2001, 2006 respectively). His background is in ancient Near Eastern archaeology, cultural heritage, and museums.

Carmen Al-Ayoubi, Project Lead / Library Director

Carmen (Humi) Al-Ayoubi is the Library Director at ACOR, and a Project Lead of the ACOR Photo Archive project. Carmen has



been instrumental in developing the library collection and has supported many students and researchers during her term as director. Prior to ACOR, Carmen worked at the University of Jordan with Dr. Kamil al-Assali. Carmen has a Master's of Science in Library and Information Sciences and a Master's of Science in Education from Indiana University and a B.A. in Philosophy from the Catholic University of Peru.



Jessica Holland, Archivist

Jessica joined ACOR as Archivist in January 2019. Jessica specializes in Digital Curation and outreach activities, part of a long-

The main objectives of the National Library of Jordan include: keeping, organizing and introducing to the public the national intellectual output of Jordan; collecting and keeping books, manuscripts, periodicals, photographs, recordings, videotapes, and other materials relevant to national Jordanian heritage in particular, collecting governmental documents, working as a supervisor and coordinator for public libraries, determining the standards of library works to improve libraries and library services, and planning to establish new libraries; introducing information and library services to researchers and learners who can benefit from the Department's inventory; organizing conferences, seminars, and workshops relevant to libraries and documentation, in addition to conducting and participation in book and document exhibitions; cooperation with National Libraries and Archives Centers internationally.

ACOR is a non-profit, 501(c)(3) academic institution dedicated to promoting research and publication in the humanities and social sciences, with a particular focus on issues related to Jordan and the broader Middle East. Presenting Institutions

Jack Reed — Stanford University Libraries



Jack is a software engineer working on digital discovery of and access to cultural heritage content. A co-founder of the GeoBlacklight project and an active contributor to many open source software projects, Jack is passionate about building software for the IIIF, library, and geospatial data communities. He also serves on the executive committee of The International Association for Geoscience Diversity. Jack received his BS in Geology from Georgia State University and MS in Computer Science from the Georgia Institute of Technology.

Stanford University Libraries

Stanford University was founded in 1885 by California senator Leland Stanford and his wife, Jane, "to promote the public welfare by exercising an influence in behalf of humanity and civilization." Jane Stanford's grand and visionary plan in the early 1900s to expand the footprint of the university's library was based on her determination that the university bearing her son's name not only serve the intellectual pursuits of its current faculty and students but also that it prepare itself to attract and serve a larger future community with more diverse academic interests. The Stanford Libraries have strengths in many distinct collecting areas from Mexican American collections to artists' books. Anticipating the needs of tomorrow's scholars is at the core of how Stanford Libraries collects and develops digital research tools and services.

John Hayhurst — British Library and Qatar Foundation Partnership (BLQFP)



John Hayhurst is a content specialist on the British Library-Qatar Foundation Partnership Program, based at the British Library. After obtaining a degree in Social Anthropology from Goldsmiths College, University of London, he spent several years travelling, working, and studying in several places across the Middle East and North Africa, including two years in Jordan where he was Librarian and



Research Assistant at the British Institute in Amman, part of the Council for British Research in the Levant.

The Qatar Digital Library - www.qdl.qa

The Qatar Digital Library (QDL) has been developed as part of a 10-year Memorandum of Understanding on Partnerships between the Qatar Foundation, the Qatar National Library and The British Library. The QDL is making a vast archive featuring the cultural and historical heritage of the Gulf and wider region freely available online for the first time. It includes archives, maps, manuscripts, sound recordings, photographs and much more, complete with contextualised explanatory notes and links, in both English and Arabic.

Ahmad Lash – Department of Antiquities (DOA)



Ahmad Lash is the Head of the Archaeological Loans Sector, in the Excavation and Survey Directorate, at the Department of Antiquities of Jordan. He obtained his BA in Archaeology from the University of Jordan in 1997, and has since worked on a wide variety of projects in archaeology and heritage throughout the country. In addition to the Azraq Community Archaeology Program, he is a head of Roots project, he has been closely involved in the development of the MEGA Jordan database system, and he led the restoration and excavations at the "desert castles" sites of Al-Azraq, Amra, Tuba, Mushatta, and Qastal.

Dr. Nashrawan Al-Tahat — University of Jordan Library



Nashrawan Al-Tahat is an Assistant Professor in the Library and Information Science at the University of Jordan. She holds a PhD degree in Information Science from the University of Sheffield in the UK. Her PhD thesis explored the factors shaping the network dynamic of international students. She was granted the school travel excellence award to present her work in the 10th Networked Learning conference in Denmark and she published a paper



based on her PhD work in the Studies in Higher Education Journal. Dr. Tahat is currently the director of the University of Jordan library. She also worked as the LIS department chair from 2014-2016. Dr. Tahat's research focuses on social media and its applications. Her current research interests are in information security and research data management.

University of Jordan Library - ju.edu.jo

The University Library began offering its services to students and pioneers at the beginning of the founding of the university in 1962, providing services to students and researchers through the public library, which has an area of (12,000 m 2), in addition to seventeen reading rooms distributed across all faculties and centers of the university.

Jihad Kafafi – The Jordan Museum



Jihad Kafafi is Curator at the Jordan museum; he received his MSc from Yarmouk University 1999 and B.A from The University of Jordan 1996. Before the Jordan Museum, Jihad worked with UNESCO at Hisham's Palace project/Jericho (1999-2002) as an archeologist. This project included excavation, documentation, and establishing a site museum. Jihad has been one of the core members of establishing Jordan's first national museum (The Jordan Museum) since 2003, working on exhibition design and museum collection management. He has participated in many conferences related to the cultural heritage and museums, nationally and internationally, and has some publications in the field of museums and preservation of cultural heritage.

Dr. Yosha Alamri – The Jordan Museum



Yosha Alamri has been a curator at the Jordan Museum since 2008. Earlier, he worked as an inspector of antiquities at the Department of Antiquities of Jordan. In 2008 received his PhD on the beginning of iron metallurgy in the southern Levant from the Ruhr University-Bochum, Germany. He received his MSc in archeometry in archaeology from Yarmouk university-Irbid, Jordan in 1999. Alamri excavated many archaeological sites in Jordan and abroad, and participated in projects to preserve cultural sites in Jordan. He gained experience in museology, exhibitions, and microenvironment in museums. He now curates the Jordan museum, teaches, and trains museum staff on the preventive conservation of archaeological objects.

Dr. Hashem Kries – GPIA / DOJAM



Dr. Hashem Khries holds a PhD in archaeology and art history of the ancient near east from the University of Bologna in Italy. Currently he works for the GPIA in the project of Documentation of the Objects in the Jordanian Archaeological Museums (DOJAM).

Dr. Jutta Häser – GPIA / DOJAM

Dr. Jutta Häser is the Manager of the project of Documentation of the Objects in the Jordanian Archaeological Museums (DOJAM), which is a cooperation project of the GPIA and the DOA and is financed by the German Gerda Henkel Foundation. This four-year pilot project is focused on the building-up of a museum database which is also planned to be used in other archaeological museums in Jordan.

GPIA, Amman - <u>deiahl.de</u>

The GPIA library in Amman specializes in books and periodicals on archaeology, history, the old testament, geology, and heritage. It offers an excellent collection of German publications in the field of archaeology including rare antiquarian books. The GPIA library in Amman owns a photo archive available for consultation on-site covering the Institute's research projects in Jordan, in particular at the ancient site of Gadara (Umm Qais).

Abbad Diraneyya – Wikimedia Levant / Jordan Open Source Association



Abbad Diraneyya is a Wikipedian, writer, translator, and activist in promoting free & open content in Arabic language. Abbad joined Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia, as a volunteer in 2008, and has since contributed about 1,000 articles and 25,000 edits to Arabic Wikipedia. He's currently the Chief Coordinator of Wikimedia Levant (an NGO promoting Wikipedia in four Arabic-speaking countries), a program coordinator in the Jordanian Open Source Association, and a previous lead of Arabic language translation at Khan Academy. He has published a freely licensed e-book called "حكاية ويكيبيديا" ("The Story of Wikipedia").

Wikimedia Levant is a non-profit organization active in four Arabic-speaking countries that promotes free and open knowledge, chiefly on the well-known online encyclopedia, Wikipedia.
